Fraud Proof Ballot Box.

A new type of ballot box has been patented which guards against election frauds by stamping each ballot as it is deposited, by counting the votes, and by remaining closed except when operated by a special key. This box is also provided with a small crank that is connected with the stamping and recording apparatus. It is so made that when the locking device is released, the turning of the crank admits the ballot to the container, records the vote by adding one to the number in the open-face register, and stamps the sheets with any desired legend in such a way that two ballots cannot be cast at once and both be marked properly.

Curious Walking Feet.

The most curious walking feat in Scotland dates back to a former century, when Sir Andrew Leth Hay and Lord Kennedy did a great walk for a bet of £4,500. Hay said he could walk from Blair hall in Kincardineshire to Inverness in less time than Kennedy. They started off that very night at nine o'clock, in their evening clothes, with their shoes and silk stockings. Sir Andrew took the coach road via Huntly and Elgin. Lord Kennedy, with Captain Ross as umpire, went straight across the Grampians in pouring rain. They walked all that night, all next day, and the following night, and Lord Kennedy got to Inverness at six o'clock in the morning of the third day, and won his bet by four hours.

GEORGE M. BROWN IS AGAIN A CANDIDATE

Salem, Jan. 22.—Attorney General George M. Brown said today that he will be a candidate at the republican primaries for re-election. He said he would make his formal announcement soon. He is now serving his first term.

Before his election as attorney general, Mr. Brown as district attorney in Douglas county became widely known for his vigorous and successful prosecution of law violators.

Upon his election as attorney general, he took up the notorious Hyde-Benson land fraud cases, which had been instituted by his predecessor at the direction of former Governor West, but which had been permitted to drag along without anything being accomplished.

Mr. Brown won favorable decisions from the circuit and supreme courts, and caused to be restored to the state nearly 10,000 acres of valuable lands, while further action is needed to recover about 15,000 acres additional in which the government has interest in title.

Mr. Brown is also gathering evidence in the Pacific Livestock company land fraud cases, which are somewhat similar to the Hyde-Benson cases and which have been buffeted about in the past by officials wishing to have the cases dropped.

CHILDREN NEED MILK

Without It Growth Ceases and
Health Is Impaired.

United States Children's Bureau Sees
Danger in Situation Caused by
High Prices.

Washington.—The news that many American babies are now going without milk because of its high price is a matter of grave alarm to the United States children's bureau.

"Milk is one food that all young children must have if they are to be strong and healthy," the bureau warns. "Whole milk is rich in the elements without which the child's growth ceases and his health is impaired; indeed, there is no food which can supply as well the needs of the growing child. There is no substitute for milk in the diet of babies and young children."

Undernourishment, especially in childhood, is the basis of many evils. Sometimes when the brain cells are starved it results in feeble-mindedness; it is conducive to tuberculosis, to weak muscles and weak character. It is the leading cause of inefficiency.

Occasionally the absence of milk is due to ignorance—the family fails to realize its importance in the infant's diet. Usually the family simply can't afford it. Wages are higher, but the price of foodstuffs manage to keep a little ahead of them. Few workmen, even earning a comparatively high wage, can afford to pay \$7 a month for milk for four children. Yet \$9 would buy only a pint of milk a day for each of these children.

Under these circumstances child welfare workers are hoping that the government itself will step in and see that American babies and children receive the proper amount of milk. American men are leaving by the thousands to fight and protect their women and children, but of what avail is it if in the meantime the children are allowed to starve at home?

WHAT THUMBS ARE WORTH

Digit Is Estimated to Represent Fully
One-Third of the Total Value
of the Hand.

One has only to grasp a pen or a tool of some sort to realize that the different fingers are far from having the same value in regard to their usefulness in performing work. The most important, states a writer, is the thumb, for without it seizing or holding would be very imperfect. The hand is no longer piners, but merely a claw, when deprived of the thumb. It may be estimated that the thumb represents fully a third of the total value of the hand. The total loss of the thumb is estimated by competent authorities as 15 to 55 per cent for the right and 10 to 15 per cent for the left hand, except for workers in art, when 40 to 50 per cent for the right and 25 to 40 per cent for the left hand comes nearer the value.

The total loss of the index finger causes an incapacity estimated at from 10 to 25 per cent for the right hand and 10 to 15 per cent for the left. The middle finger is less important than the index. The ring finger is least important, and the little finger may be compared to its neighbor, except in the professions in which it serves as a point of support for the hand.

ONE OF WORLD'S GREAT MEN

Johnny Appleseed, Responsible for
Many Orchards in Wide Range, Will
Not Soon Be Forgotten.

John Chapman's name occupies an important place in our American history, for he is known as "Johnny Appleseed," the Apostle of Apple Growing. The result was thousands of producing apple orchards throughout this vast territory.
