The principles upon which I stand and to which I pledge myself are:

1. To support the national administration and the heads of the government with all my ability and energy in the speedy and vigorous prosecution of the war to a peace satisfactory to the democracy of the world and compatible with the highest ideals of our civilization.

2. To the application of the selective draft in practice as well as theory, which shall insure organization of the national army and at the same time reserve the necessary labor and supplies for the continuation of our industrial pursuits and commerce.

3. To an equitable control and regulation of food supplies, commerce and industry, and the establishment of a primary market in Portland on equal basis with Chicago and eastern ports.

4. To a nation-wide prohibition and to all measure which shall make it practicable and operative and not theoretical.

5. To permanently establish equal suffrage in both state and nation.

6. To establishment by the federal government of a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia River.

7. To effective rural credit legislation and administration with a particular view to its adaptability to the needs of Oregon.

8. To construction by the federal government of a military highway along the Pacific Coast, and federal aid in the construction of permanent highways.

9. To see that Oregon participates, all things being equal, in national trade, commerce and industry, and that our state is given recognition in the federal expenditures made necessary by the war.

10. To legislation which shall bring to a settlement the public lands question, and the greater development of Oregon's natural resources including the development of water power, reclamation of arid, swamp and logged off lands.

11. To the organization and mobilization of all our industrial forces, with a just and proper consideration of the rights of labor, which shall guarantee coordination of American efforts during the war.

12. The legislation that will permit the natural resources of the great West and Alaska to be used, at the same time being careful that these natural resources are used economically.

13. To the removal of the misunderstanding and opposition on the part of the federal authorities which has restricted Oregon's commercial expansion and retarded her industrial development.

14. To the development of Oregon's great shipping ports, through federal improvement of waterways and harbors; the maintenance of a merchant marine on the Pacific Ocean, and a just recognition on the part of the federal government of the importance, value, commercial and industrial advantage of Oregon's location, situation and harbor, and shipping facilities.

15. To a policy of conservation and reconstruction which shall insure our national integrity, honor and commerce and the moral and civic purity of our people.

16. To have that high regard and consideration for the interests and progress of humanity and the nation at large, which is typified by a conscientious and moral observance of true Christian civilization.

MACHINERY ARRIVING FOR STATE LIMESTONE PLANT

Gold Hill, Jan. 23.—(Special)—The machinery for the state limestone fertilizer plant has arrived from the east. The shipment weighing 29,000 pounds, consists of a complete unit of 200 tons capacity machinery, which is to be installed by the commission, and will be removed to the quarry at once.

The aerial tramway recently purchased by the commission at the Greenback mine has been dismantled and is now being loaded for shipment to Gold Hill. The shipment will require two large capacity cars, and will be accompanied by the crew of honor men from the penitentiary, who have been engaged in dismantling it.

The empty Gold Hill hotel building has been engaged to house the men pending the construction of quarters at the plant site at the quarry. Lumber has been ordered from the local mills to erect the plant and construct quarters for the men. The late rains have made the roads almost impassable and should they continue the delivery of the lumber and the machinery to the quarry may be delayed.

The California-Oregon Power company has made a survey of the power line from the Gold Hill substation to the quarry and will begin construction of the line at once. The power line will parallel the aerial-tramway from the Southern Pacific company's siding below Gold Hill.

BLUE LEDGE DISTRICT COPPER MINE BONDED

A big mining deal was completed Monday when L. H. Van Horn, the well known mining man of Kerby, and associates took a lease and bond for two years on the Copper King mine in the Blue Ledge district with the stipulation that work at the mine must begin inside of 60 days. No information was given out of the consideration, but rumor on the streets was that the sum is \$75,000; nor as to the identity of the men associated with Mr. Van Horn in the venture.

A number of well known Medford men have a financial interest in the Copper King mine, which is the property the late E. L. Jones opened and partially developed. The mine consists of eight claims or 160 acres, is generally conceded by experienced prospectors and miners as one of the very best prospects in the Blue Ledge district.

While according to contract work of development the mine must begin inside of 60 days, it is understood that Mr. Van Horn will establish a camp and have a force of men at work in 30 days.—Medford Tribune.

TURKS IN PALESTINE DESERT HUN GENERAL

Washington, Jan. 23.—One hundred and sixty thousand Turkish troops—more than 50 per cent of General Falkenhayn's reorganized Turkish army—deserted during the recent journey from Constantinople to Palestine, official dispatches today stated.

General Falkenhayn, appointed by the Kaiser to reorganize the crumbling Moslems after General Allenby's victorious Holy Land campaign, has returned to Constantinople and his entire plan for the rehabilitation of the sultan's forces has been abandoned, the reports declare.

"More than 50 per cent of the strength of 24 Turkish divisions was lost by desertions during the journey from Constantinople to Palestine," General Allenby's report declares, adding that 41 companies of storm troops which left the Alexandria district, each 300 strong, reached the front with only 4 officers and 100 men per company.

Even Turkish officers refused to "fall in" with Falkenhayn's program, reports declare, and openly voiced their dissatisfaction, knowing well the unreliability of the disheartened, war-weary native troops.

In less than three days Falkenhayn abandoned the Palestine sector and returned in disgust to Constantinople.

KLAMATH TO FINISH COUNTY COURT HOUSE

Klamath Falls, Jan. 23.—Three estimates ranging from \$120,000 to \$282,000 submitted by Portland architects for the completion of the new county court house were made public here Monday afternoon. The completion of the structure which was commenced under the former administration of Judge Will S. Worden, is one of the things uppermost in the minds of the county residents at this time.

More than a quarter of a million dollars have been spent on the building to date while it has been allowed to stand and deteriorate without completion for the last three years.

Recently three architects were selected to submit estimates on its completion. The county court will select one of these immediately to submit more detailed figures on the work.
