JOSEPHINE WOMEN IN HOME ECONOMICS

A meeting of representative women from different communities of Josephine county was held in Grants Pass Tuesday afternoon. Twenty women were present and took part in perfecting an organization which will be known as the Josephine County Home Economics Committee. The meeting was called by Miss Anne McCormick, emergency home demonstration agent, for Jackson and Josephine counties. The members of the committee voted to adopt the county program of work for the year which was presented by Miss McCormick.

Mr. Wylberg, president of the Josephine Agricultural council, Mr. Thompson, county agricultural agent, Mrs. Bacon, county school superintendent, and Miss Anna M. Turley, state leader of home demonstration agents, were present at the meeting. Miss Turley outlined a plan of organization in which the home demonstration work, the agricultural work and the boys and girls club work of the county could be correlated, and showed the strength that would result from a union of these three factors in the war emergency work in the county. Mrs. W. G. White, Mrs. U. D. Mihills, and Mr. Wylberg were chosen as the officers of the home economics committee, and will also serve on the executive committee of the county agricultural council.

A very delightful luncheon was served to those in attendance by the domestic science girls of the Grants Pass high school under the supervision of their instructor, Miss Edna Cornell.

SCOUTS CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY WEEK

The anniversary week celebrating the eighth birthday of the Boy Scouts of America will be observed by the local troop in an interesting manner. On Friday evening of this week the first part of the examinations for second class scout will be given by the troop committee. On Saturday the field tests and concluding examinations will be held. Special services in the various churches in recognition of the boys will occupy the Sunday program. On Wednesday in the Chamber of Commerce rooms a special banquet prepared by the ladies of the Red Cross for the "Boys and their dads" and to others who are specially interested in Boy Scouts work will complete the celebration.

Interest in the work of the Boy Scouts is specially pronounced at this time on account of their signal service in war garden, food conservation and liberty loan campaigns. In the second Liberty loan campaign the Boy Scouts numbering nearly 300,000 sold bonds worth more than \$102,000,000. That is one out of every 18 bonds was sold by the boys.

MRS. THOMPSON GIVES WAR BREAD RECIPES

These receipts are some of the "war" breads served at the Chamber of Commerce Monday luncheon and receipts have been asked for by so many that I am asking you kindly to publish them.

Bran Rolls

One and one-half cups of milk, one-half cup fat or fat substitute, one-half cup potato yeast or one yeast cake, one and one-half cups bran, one teaspoon salt, one tablespoon sugar (or syrup).

Add flour enough to form a dough one-half cup corn and one-half cup of oats or rye may be used in place of all wheat flour. Set to rise over night. In the morning work down, let rise again, then mold into turnovers, let rise until light, then bake in a quick oven.

Spider Corn Cake

One and one-half cups corn meal, one cup sour milk, one teaspoon soda, one teaspoon salt, two eggs, two tablespoons of melted fat.

Mix soda, salt and corn meal, add eggs well beaten and milk. Heat frying-pan, grease sides and bottom, turn in mixture and bake in hot oven twenty minutes.

Steamed Brown Bread

One cup war bread crumbs, one cup corn meal, one-half cup molasses, one cup sour milk, one-half cup raisins, one teaspoon (level) soda, one teaspoon salt. Mix and steam for two hours. This amount will fill two baking powder cans.

HIGHWAY COMMISSION DEFERS OPENING BIDS

Portland, Feb. 6.—The state highway commission, in session here, indefinitely deferred opening bids for \$500,000 of road bonds and voted to do no road building except on such main line sections as would be available for military purposes, and then only after such work was authorized by the federal government.

The action was taken following the receipt of a telegram from Paul M. Warburg, chairman of the capital issues committee of the federal reserve board, in reply to a request for permission to receive bids.

Mr. Warburg's message said the committee broadly holds that no expenditures should be made at this time except those that are clearly compatible and essential to the national welfare as distinguished from local interest.

HUNS MAKE ANOTHER AIR RAID ON PADUA

Italian Army Headquarters in Italy, Feb. 6.—Padua was again terrorized last night by continuous air raids. Several houses were damaged, but there were few casualties.

Italian aviators brought down four enemy machines, and the British got eight at various points where aerial battles are being fought without cessation.

HAS UNIQUE COAT OF ARMS

Washington Woman Uses 25,000 Canceled Postage Stamps in Making It.

Aberdeen, Wash.—Twenty-five thousand canceled postage stamps, representing 13 administrations, have been used by Mrs. Sarah Erickson, of this city, to make a government coat of arms. The stamps were gathered in the last 25 years.

The coat of arms represents an American eagle with outspread wings and below it are five spears and a shield. Three stamps are from the George Washington administration, a lodge has offered Mrs. Erickson \$2,200 for the picture, but she has refused it. She still is gathering stamps for the completion of the work. She will add the words "Liberty" and "E Pluribus Unum."
