The importance of keeping up a constant supply of men for our war forces in Europe was emphasized by Colonel Leader.

"We will win and keep up the fight so long as there is a man or woman left in the countries of civilization," he said. "If anything happens to keep the United States army from getting to France I believe this war will last 20 years."

Colonel Leader believes that one of the things that might happen is an attempted invasion of the Pacific

We have not given the possibility that our own state might become a battleground in the great world war much consideration. We are not inclined to believe that the danger is as great as Colonel Leader thinks, but we are certain that no greater step for national defense could be taken than the organization of "home guard" in every city and town of the state of Oregon.
