**Be Careful With Electricity.**

Some safety hints for the wise, which are intended to guard against serious accidents and a possible loss of life, are being sent out broadcast by the electric light companies. From them may be selected the following: Do not cover an electric globe with paper or cloth. It may start a fire. Do not hang an ordinary lamp cord over a nail or metal work. Do not leave a cord connected when you are through with it. Do not touch any wire that is down on the ground, whether it is an electric, telephone or guy wire. In an emergency, remove a wire with an instrument equipped with a wooden handle, keeping the full length of the handle between yourself and the wire.—Popular Science Monthly.

### PRIVATE FRED VINCENT VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA

Josephine county is again called upon to mourn the loss of another of her sons who answered the call to arms, but fell before facing the foe. Fred R. Vincent succumbed to pneumonia Monday morning, February 25, at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, aged 25 years.

Private Vincent enlisted in Grants Pass December 10, 1917, and was stationed with the Second Training Brigade at Kelly aviation field, Texas. Two weeks ago he contracted pneumonia. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ike Vincent of Missouri Flat, one sister and two brothers. He came to Josephine county with his parents, when only a year old, and spent his childhood at Missouri Flat, going away at different times to work.

Private Vincent was a member of the Grants Pass Lodge I. O. O. F., and is the second member of the local lodge to die in the U. S. service. The body is expected to arrive here on Saturday, and burial will be made at the Missouri Flat cemetery.

### MEDFORD PREPARED FOR OIL PROSPECT

Medford, Feb. 26.—The oil rig belonging to Lee Davenport of Portland, who is contemplating prospecting for oil in this vicinity, in connection with local people, provided the required acreage and leases are secured, has arrived in Medford, but will not be put in action until the proper acreage is listed.

It is customary in an unproven field for land owners to list their property with a developing company who furnish the machinery and money to drill and each take a certain per cent of production provided oil or gas is struck. If this is done the prospects for developing this field seems to be bright.

**Moslem Polygamy.**

The only passage in the Koran that refers to the subjects of polygamy is the third verse of the fourth Sutra. It reads: "And if ye are apprehensive that ye shall not deal fairly with orphans, then of other women who seem good in your eyes marry but two, or three, or four; and if ye still fear that ye shall not act equitably, then one only; or the slaves whom ye have acquired; this will make justice on your part easier." Since at the time of Mahomet the Arabians were allowed to marry as many wives as they pleased, this passage, instead of being an encouragement of polygamy, must be interpreted rather as a diplomatic recommendation of monogamy on account of the difficulty of realizing the conditions involved with the privilege.
