HOW TO PAY YOUR INCOME TAX

Pay your income tax, if possible, by check, money order, or draft. This is the urgent request of the bureau of internal revenue. More than 6,000,000 persons this year will pay an income tax. The total to be collected under the war revenue act of October 3, 1917, in individual income taxes alone is \$666,000,000. The vast majority of these payments will be small amounts. If paid as requested it will avoid the necessity for the issuance of a receipt, and save much time and labor.

Taxes paid to deputies who are visiting every county in the United States to assist taxpayers in making out their returns are sent to the collector of internal revenue of the district in which the taxes are collected. Checks, money orders, or drafts can be handled without difficulty. Cash has to be sent by registered mail or by insured express. In the conduct of the war Uncle Sam is beset with many difficulties. You can render one of his innumerable tasks less difficult by paying your income tax promptly, and by check, money order, or draft.—From the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

The war savings stamp organization plans that every home in the state shall hear the message of thrift and of its particular application at this time in connection with the government's thrift stamp and war savings stamp campaign, in the household canvass set for March 19, 20, 21, 22 and 23. Ten thousand volunteer workers throughout the state have enlisted for the work, which is not to be a drive for money. Ministers throughout the state will give the campaign the "kick-off" on Sunday, March 17, officially proclaimed as "Thrift Sunday," when they will preach and speak on thrift from their pulpits. "A thrift stamp in every home to stamp thrift in every home" will be the campaign slogan.

AMERICAN DOCTRINE WHEN WAR IS OVER

Los Angeles, Mar. 13.—Twenty-one republics of the western hemisphere will subscribe to a new Monroe doctrine, embracing the cardinal principles already established and adding additional tenets, according to a statement here tonight by Dr. Alvarez, secretary general of the permanent member of the court of Institute of International Law and arbitration at The Hague.

The new principles, Dr. Alvarez says, will prevent the cessation of any territory in the western hemisphere as a war indemnity to any European power and will prevent the acquisition of such territory by any European power for any purpose by any method. Dr. Alvarez said the new doctrine was based on the interpretation of President Wilson's war message of last August as interpreted by the American Institute of Inter-

FLYING COWBOYS ON DUTY ITALIAN FRONT

Rome, Feb. 2.—(Correspondence) —"Flying Cowboys" is the popular title given here to Uncle Sam's first fighting corps in Italy. The American aviators, officers and students located at a training camp in southern Italy are frequent visitors in Rome and as they all wear the United States army's service hat, popularly known here as the "cowboy" hat the word cowboy has been applied to them.

That these aviators are regarded as cowboys was illustrated by an incident with a cab driver that occurred when a party of them were on leave in Rome and went outside the city walls to see the Catacombs of St. Callistus on the Appian Way. When the aviators got out of the cab near the entrance to the burial place of the early Christians, they asked the cab driver to wait, so he could drive them back to the city.

"But my horse can't stand the trip back with such a heavy load," he explained. "It's war time and we haven't corn or wheat to feed him, so he's too weak. I've got a family to support and I must take good care of this horse. You cowboys ought to understand how it is."

"Very well, we'll buy your horse, won't we fellows," spoke up one of the aviators who had just been paid off. "If he's still alive when we get back to town we will sell him back to you."

While the proposition was made in all seriousness the driver, thinking he was about to be made the victim of some wild west trick, abruptly refused and drove off with his plug leaving the "cowboys" to walk back.
