I. W. W. AGITATION NIPPED IN CUBA

Havana, Mar. 13.—Revelations following the arrest last Sunday of Aquilino Lopez and Hilario Alonso indicate that members of the Industrial Workers of the World, although under arrest in Chicago are still carrying on their attempts to spread their propaganda throughout Cuba.

Among the papers seized by the Cuban chief of police when Lopez and Alonso were taken into custody was a proclamation said to have been signed by one of the large numbers of I. W. W. members now in jail in Chicago, urging sympathizers with the movement to continue their agitation in Cuba.

The proclamation said that, although members of the I. W. W. were in jail in Chicago, their power had not decreased. The name of the writer of the proclamation has not been made public.

OREGON-WASHINGTON LOSE OUT IN CASE EMERGENCY BOARD TO MEET MARCH 20

Salem, Mar. 13.—The Shasta differential case has been decided against the northwest, by an investigator for the Interstate commerce commission. He has advised the commission to set aside the ruling making the same fare from the east via Seattle and Portland as via New Orleans. Oregon and Washington will probably file objections.
