AMERICAN TROOPS ARE READY FOR "ANYTHING"

With the American Army in France, Mar. 15.—The American troops are "ready to attack anything."

The officer commanding the American forces in the Luneville region so stated in a message to the home folks today.

"The spirit of the command is excellent," the commander declared. "It couldn't be better. After their experience in the trenches their nervousness has passed. They are now ready to attack anything. Their health is excellent."

Crack German fighting divisions are opposed to the Americans in their sector, including dismounted Uhlans, it has now been established.

One salient bombarded preparatory to Saturday's raid has now been abandoned by the enemy. It was so demolished that it was untenable. The Boches apparently intend merely to hold the positions in the rear of this point.

Sheep Has Wooden Leg.

Charles Krauter, living near Bucyrus, O., had a lamb get tangled up in a fence and injure its leg. The veterinary told him the leg had to come off. Krauter did not want to lose the lamb, so minus the leg he nursed it back to health and then fixed up a peg leg for it.

Now the lamb has grown to be a sheep and still stumps around on the wooden leg. Occasionally the wooden member becomes loose and falls off, and the sheep then hobbles over to a soft spot and waits until some one comes along to fasten the leg on again.

The wooden leg doesn't interfere with the sheep growing wool. Mr. Krauter says, and wool is wool nowadays.

Proud Record of Marines.

As the first battle of the American navy was fought and won by the marines, so, down through the years of the Revolutionary war, we find the marines at the forefront when difficult work was to be done. In fact there were but few expeditions in which they did not figure in more or less strength. Thus Lieutenant Wallingford of the marines died at the head of his men under John Paul Jones in the battle between the Ranger and the Drake; and in the classic fight between the Bon Homme Richard under Paul Jones and the Serapis, the marines lost 40 out of 137 men.

TRANSPORTATION CONGESTION IS RELIEVED BY HIGHWAY

Philadelphia, Mar. 15.—Frequent passages of trains of United States motor trucks through Pennsylvania to the Atlantic seaboard have served to call attention to the extensive use which the federal government now is making of the state roads. Runs over the Lincoln highway which is the main "link" between Philadelphia, New York and Pittsburg, have been pronounced so successful that the war department has asked the state highway department to concentrate its efforts on the maintenance of this road.

In addition to the Lincoln highway numerous other main avenues throughout the state have assumed importance as strategic arteries to tidewater. One of the most notable is that connecting Philadelphia and Chester, Pa., over which is transported a large percentage of the output of the munitions producing belt.
