BODY OF MINER FOUND 4 DAYS AFTER DEATH

The body of W. B. Flamm was discovered Sunday morning in his home on East D street where he had killed himself, probably four days before. Flamm, who is a miner and was living alone, had been missed by his neighbors, and on noticing that the door, which when the house is vacant is usually fastened with a padlock, was not locked, the house was entered and Flamm was discovered lying on a couch near a window with a 45-caliber revolver on the floor near his outstretched hand. At first murder was suspected, but on examination of the wound showed suicide plainly. There was no apparent cause for the suicide. In his pocket was \$400 in gold and five silver dollars.

Mr. Flamm, who some years ago was divorced was a miner, and recognized as the best pocket hunter in this section. He had been a resident of the city for more than 25 years past. He is survived by his divorced wife and daughter, residents of Portland, and a son, Dannie, now in service in France.

He was a member of the Grants Pass lodges of Odd Fellows, Masons, Knights of Pythias and Macabees. The funeral will be held at the Clark & Holman undertaking chapel Tuesday afternoon at 3:30, with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. The services will be in charge of the Odd Fellows lodge.

Paris, Apr. 1.—French and British broke up the assaulting waves north of Montdidier, where Germans threw in large bodies of troops. Further south they incessantly tried to take Grivense, but French retained the town, inflicting heavy losses.

GERMAN LOSSES PLACED ABOUT 275,000 OR 300,000

Washington, Apr. 1.—A French official statement estimates German losses at 275,000 to 300,000. The enemy is sending wounded to Belgium, to conceal losses from the German people.

BULGARIAN TROOPS ON WESTERN FRONT

Paris, Apr. 1.—Official announcement was made today that the presence on the Franco-British front of Bulgarian and Austrian troops has now been established.

This announcement has given rise to speculation regarding the situation in Italy where it has been reported recently that 40 new Austrian divisions have arrived to reinforce the offensive on the southern front. It is a question as to the strength of the Austro-Bulgarian force on the western front, but it indicates that Germany again has gained complete domination over her allies and will draw on their resources to the fullest extent to further her plans against the entente in the west.

Bulgaria's entry in the campaign on the western front makes her an open enemy of the United States, which has not yet declared war on the Balkan state, as American troops soon will be a part of the allied army in the present battle.

THEODORE B. WILCOX DIES IN PORTLAND

Portland, Apr. 1.—Theodore B. Wilcox, milling commissioner for the eighth federal grain district and president of the Portland Flouring Mills company, died at his home, 215 King street, at 3:30 yesterday afternoon after an illness of two weeks.

Death was due to acute intestinal trouble, which manifested itself during his recent visit to New York, where he was summoned on federal business. Upon his return home he was immediately placed under medical care, but sank rapidly.

It was his devotion to his duties as milling commissioner that contributed to his final illness. It is believed, for Mr. Wilcox insisted upon making the trip to New York to meet with the milling division of the grain corporation, although he was open enemy of the United States, which has not yet declared war on the Balkan state, as American troops soon will be a part of the allied army in the present battle.
