## LINCOLN'S TARIFF VIEWS

In a speech delivered at Pittsburg February 15, 1861, Abraham Lincoln said: "The tariff question must be as enduring as government: itself. It is a question of national housekeeping. It is to the government what replenishing the meal-tub is to the family. Ever-varying circumstances will require frequent modifications as to the amount needed and the sources of supply. So far there is little difference of opinion among the people. It is as to whether, and how far, duties on imports shall be adjusted in favor of home production in the home market, that controversy begins. One party insists that such adjustment oppresses one class for the advantage of another, while the other party argues that, with all its incidents, in the long run all classes are benefited. In the Chicago platform there is a plank upon this subject which should do neither more nor less than we gave the people reason to believe we would when they gave us their votes."

Here is the plank referred to:

"That while providing revenue for the support of the general government by duties upon imports, sound policy requires such an adjustment of these imports as will encourage the development of the industrial interests of the whole country; and we commend that policy of national exchange which secures to working men liberal wages, to agriculture remunerating prices, to mechanics and manufacturers adequate reward for their skill, labor, and enterprise, and to the nation commercial prosperity and independence."

## PROHIBITION GAINS IN ILLINOIS ELECTION

Chicago, Apr. 3.—Gains for the prohibitionists were recorded in yes-

terday's township elections on the west and dry issues throughout Illinois.

Of the larger cities of the state, Bloomington gave a dry majority of 2,119, which was attributed to the overwhelming dry vote of the women.

Rock Island, which has been the center of a campaign by government agents to eliminate vice conditions, voted out 41 saloons by a majority of 800 votes.

But it is very pretty with narrow frills of white organdie finishing the collar and cuffs and set on the back that joins the yoke and skirt. The frills have a picot edge. Just inside them French

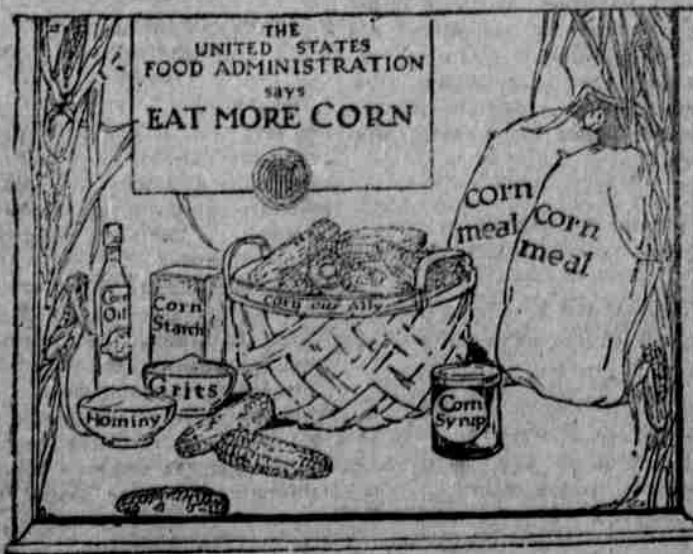
knots in black cotton, set close together in rows, add much to the beauty of the yellow and white color combination. They look just as well on this little frock when it is developed in rose-colored or blue chambray with white frills. What makes the joy of its little wearer complete is that this frock has a pair of real pockets where each day's treasure trove may be lodged.

At the right plain blue and blue and white striped gingham are put together to make an up-to-date frock. Plaids in the striped skirt are extended at the front and back so that they may lap over the belt and button to the bodice. The belt of plain gingham is removable and collar and cuffs of the striped gingham help balance the combination of the two patterns in just the right way.

In the Twilight Zone of War Financing.

FOR THE NEED FOR PROTECTION IS GREATEST WHEN EVENING APPROACHES AND THE WORKER TENDS TO REST.

Upon a time there was a farmer whose sheep were threatened by coyotes, so he decided to protect them at night with a high, tight fence. All day he labored and when evening approached it was almost, but not quite, completed.

The farmer was tagged, twilight was approaching and instead of nailing up the remaining boards he drove in the sheep and decided to take a chance. In the morning he discovered the ravages caused in the flock by the enemy marauders; the fence he had built for protection was no protection, because when twilight came he failed to finish it.

Don't permit your patriotism to succumb to the twilight zone!

In the twilight there is a slacking of industry, a tendency to take things indifferently—to loaf.

Having performed a good day's work, twilight finds a man tired of the heat and the burdens, ready to rest and congratulate himself on his accomplishments.

The Third Liberty Loan is in the twilight zone of war financing.

Twice have the people of Oregon labored indefatigably and accomplished a great work in over-subscribing the state's allotment.

## TEUTONS WILL HAVE TROUBLE RAISING CASH

Washington, Apr. 3.—The German government will have difficulty getting its war credits through the reichstag, according to the translation of an editorial in the Boerschen Zeitung, made public Monday afternoon by the committee on publication.

"War credits will come from the reichstag in the course of the next week," says the editorial. "Extensive debates are to be expected in view of events in the east. The government will not be able to avoid expressing itself in detail regarding its intentions in the east. The Finland expression will probably play an important part. In view of the situation, it will not be very easy to secure as large a majority in favor of war credits as before, and the vice chancellor will have a difficult task."

## PUT IRON IN OUR SOULS!

The Spirit of the First Line Trenches Needed in Loan Drive.

"A little more iron in our souls," was the appeal made by Lafayette Young of Des Moines recently, "a little more of the spirit of our soldiers, a stimulus that will give us a relentless and undying determination to wipe the Hohenzollern monster from the face of the earth."

American people are noted for their complacency, their seeming willingness to enjoy the fruits of their prosperity, leaving to others the task of fighting their war for them. They do not stop to realize the enormity of Germany's crime and the intense seriousness of the present world war of self-preservation, the supreme test of our manhood and our civilization.

Our soldiers are doing their part, but, says Mr. Young, "how pitiful are the cross contributions, Liberty Bonds and U. S. C. A. gifts compared with the sacrifices and sufferings of our soldiers. We have comfort, happiness, the ties and affections of home, but they, like immortal Alan Seeger, have their 'rendevous with death.'"

"We are proud," he continues, "that America has met her duty, true to her best traditions. And may God grant that those of us at home fall not in one single obligation to our soldiers, to our Allies, to our country!"

## "CANNOT MATCH THE BIBLE"

Stories in Sacred Volume Have Never Been Equaled, a Yale Professor Says.

The bulk of the people—business men, lawyers, doctors and others don't read the Bible, but writers universally recognize it as the greatest book, Prof. William Lyon Phelps of Yale university said in a recent address.

"Being a serious book it is weak in humor," Professor Phelps said. "But I think Job intended a grim joke when he said: 'Would that mine adversary had written a book!'"

"No narrative writers can match the style of the Bible's Old Testament stories—Hume, Gibbon, Ross—they are all inferior. This is the day of the short-story writer, Kipling, De Maupassant, O. Henry, but their best efforts fall short of the stories of the Bible. So it is with its poetry in the Psalms. Its wisdom of the Proverbs is just as up-to-date as the morning paper, and there is no political economy equal to the Book of Gospels."

"It is impossible to overestimate the Bible's influence on English literature. Bunyan wrote a great book because he was saturated with the Bible, and it trickled out when he wrote."

"Lincoln knew only two books—the Bible and Shakespeare, and yet he was a splendidly educated man. To know the Bible is to be educated. One of the finest metaphors in Keat's 'Ode to a Nightingale' is taken directly from the Bible; 'Nearer, My God, to Thee' is simply a paraphrase of the Bible."
