THE WISCONSIN ELECTION

The people of the state of Wisconsin by their ballots Tuesday have placed their state in the loyal column by a vote of three or four to one. Berger the socialist candidate, who was born in Germany and who there is reason to believe is more Prussian than socialist, has been overwhelmingly defeated. His "100 per cent for peace" platform and his promise to work for "the immediate withdrawal of United States troops from France" failed to make him a good third in the race against the republican and democratic candidates, notwithstanding the fact that the people of Wisconsin are largely of German and Austrian blood.

Lenroot the republican candidate, won by a majority of 10,000 over Davies, according to figures received early yesterday. Davies ran ahead of his normal party vote. This showing of strength no doubt was the result of administration support and his open declaration that if elected he would vote and work for the expulsion of LaFollette, present republican senator from Wisconsin, from the United States senate. Lenroot won in the primary election following his repudiation of LaFollette.

Either Lenroot or Davies was acceptable to the loyal forces of the nation.

Lenroot's election is a blow to LaFollette and indicates that the senator had misjudged the patriotism of Wisconsin people in his efforts to play politics by giving aid and comfort to an enemy, with whom the nation is at war.

If the election in Wisconsin yesterday is to be judged by the face returns, it would appear that Robert LaFollette can never again be elected to the United States senate from Wisconsin.—Eugene Guard.

"The war has shown nothing to shake British faith in free-trade" declares former Premier Asquith. Mr. Asquith is reflecting the views of a small minority in Great Britain at the present time. British laborers, British manufacturers, British boards of trade, and British diplomats are out for protection, and, like Sir Arthur Balfour, they have adopted the views of the late Joseph Chamberlain, the champion of protection to British industries. Great Britain has had her lesson, and protected Germany gave it to her.—Wallace (Idaho) Miner.

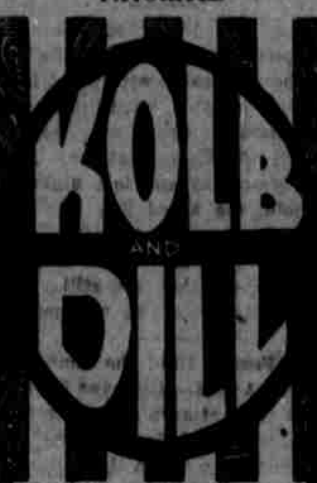

STURGEON FUNERAL SATURDAY AFTERNOON

The funeral of G. W. Sturgeon, who met his death at Bray, on Tuesday will be held here tomorrow at 2:30 p. m. at Hall's chapel, with interment at the I. O. O. F. cemetery. Rev. Chas. Hoxie of Wilderville will conduct the service. The two sons and two daughters of Mr. Sturgeon and other relatives arrived here yesterday to attend the funeral.

Details of the accident which resulted in Mr. Sturgeon's death were not known here until the arrival of his son last night from Bray. Mr. Sturgeon was pushing a two-wheeled baggage truck on which were piled several bread boxes, which probably obstructed his view. As the truck was being pushed along the track, the front edge was struck by a projection on a load of logs which was passing. This threw the man toward the train and he was struck by a log on the following car and his head crushed. Mr. Sturgeon died on the way to the hospital at Weed.
