WAR FOR HUMANITY

War, in a good cause, is not the greatest evil which a nation can suffer. War is an ugly thing, but not the ugliest of things; the decayed and degraded state of moral and patriotic feeling which thinks nothing worth a war is worse. When a people are used as mere human instruments for firing cannon or thrusting bayonets, in the service for the selfish purposes of a master, such war degrades a people. A war to protect other human beings against tyrannical injustice; a war to give victory to their own ideas of right and good, and which is their own war, carried on for an honest purpose by their free choice, is often the means of their regeneration. A man who has nothing which he is willing to fight for, nothing which he cares more about than he does about his personal safety, is a miserable creature, who has no chance of being free, unless made and kept so by the exertions of better men than himself. As long as justice and injustice have not terminated their ever-renewing fight for ascendancy in the affairs of mankind, human beings must be willing, when need is, to do battle for the one against the other.—John Stuart Mill.

This was written a half century and more ago, but it might have been written yesterday it applies so well to today's conditions. The truth is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

"I fear," said Lloyd George, Britain's famous statesman, in a recent speech, "I fear the disciplined people behind the German army. I fear the rationed German family, and the determination of the German wife and sister and daughter and mother to stand and starve so that their fighting men may be fed—I fear it more than the imperial German army itself."

QUOTA OF NEW MEN AT JUNIOR RED CROSS CAMP LEWIS EXCEEDED WILL CONDUCT SALE

Camp Lewis, Tacoma, Apr. 6.—The number of drafted men received at Camp Lewis during the past week exceeds by more than 200 the Camp Lewis quota of the special draft of 95,000 men to fill up units of the national army in all cantonments. This afternoon 4,177 had been received and there was one contingent of 31 from California yet to come. The original quota for Camp Lewis was 3,973. The fact that the number of new men exceeded the quota is accounted for by the arrival of a number of specially inducted men and others who have been sent to take the places of men discharged for physical disability, because they were enemy aliens, or for other reasons.

Saturday, April 13, the Junior Red cross auxiliaries of Riverside school, East school, Junior High school and Hugo school will sell food, war candy and clothing. This clothing has been given to the Junior Red Cross for use in their work during the last six months. It was too good to be torn up and the committee decided to offer it for sale, the proceeds to go into the Junior Red Cross fund. The children have repaired every article that needed a stitch and every garment has been freshly laundered. There is a quantity of women's underwear, men's shirts and coats, and the Junior Red Cross hopes to dispose of every article on Saturday April 13.
