SYSTEMATIC PLANS FOR LIBERTY LOANS

Washington, Apr. 6.—Machinery for gathering and reporting the millions of subscriptions to the third Liberty loan was in smooth working order when the campaign opened today on the anniversary of the nation's entrance into war. Campaign organizers have perfected a system by which subscriptions today will be tabulated in each federal reserve bank tonight, reported to Washington and made public there tomorrow. Delays and approximations of the first and second loans will be avoided, so that the nation may know daily the exact progress of its big money drive the day before.

LENROOT ASSISTANT MARKED FOR MURDER

Youngstown, O., Apr. 6.—What police and members of the family say they believe was an attempt to kill Congressman John Cooper in retaliation for his activities in behalf of Congressman Irvine L. Lenroot, successful loyalist candidate in the recent Wisconsin senatorial election failed last night.

Police say a fume fire in the Cooper home was disconnected, permitting fumes from a gas furnace to circulate through the house. Representative Cooper had left for Washington, but his wife, two children and a maid were overcome. Three neighbors who went to the Cooper house for a call were also overcome while they were trying to revive members of the Cooper family.

Members of the family say they saw two strange men near their home early last evening and this coupled with frequent telephone calls asking what time Congressman Cooper would return from Wisconsin has led both the family and police to believe that there was a deliberate attempt on the congressman's life.

SENATE DISCUSSES THE ESPIONAGE ACT

Washington, Apr. 6.—All other business was laid aside by the senate today for denunciation of disloyalty, sedition, German spies and the Industrial Workers of the World, and discussion of how the espionage act should be extended so as to curb these evils and avoid mob law, without abridging the fundamental liberties of American citizens.

While the senate debated the pending sedition bill, carrying severe penalties for disloyal utterances and attempts to obstruct the draft or liberty loans, President Wilson and the
