SOLDIER LETTERS

Extracts from letter received Friday by Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Harvey from their son, Elbert R. (Chub) Harvey, now with the U. S. marines in France.

Somewhere in France,
May 3, 1918.

Dear Mother and Daddy:
I received two letters from you a few days ago, one of March 11 and one of March 18.

I am getting the papers pretty regular. Got the package from Daddy, but have not got yours yet, but may get it any day as the mails are often delayed. Am so glad that you are well.

We are having the finest kind of weather here now. Just like spring weather at home. A little fog in the morning, but nice and warm the rest of the day.

We had a field meet at a near by town last Sunday. The whole bunch went down and we had quite a time. The marines had only a few men in the contests but made a good showing in all the events they entered.

They sure have some funny ideas over here in this country. For one thing everything is done left handed. Where railroads are double track, the trains run on the left hand track and the engines are driven from the left side and nearly all pipe fittings and such stuff have left hand threads.

There are some of the Co. B Third Oregon boys pretty close to us. I am going to try to see some of them if I possibly can.

I am all right and just feeling fine so don't worry about me.

patriotic citizens will take from our scant supply, our white flour to our grocery stores.

Use less sugar we are asked and willingly we meet the request, but in these critical two months the brewer will waste 19,500,000 tons of sugar and sugar substitutes.

There is a serious coal shortage threatening, buy your coal at once, alright, while we line up and take our medicine like good Americans, we will look across the street and see the brewer shovel into his wasteful furnace 1,500,000 tons of coal during June and July.

Freight is congested, ship only essentials and buy home products. We are with you, but we look with dismay on the 2,000 freight trains of 60 cars each that thunder by loaded with the product of our wasted food grains and sugar.

Every man to some useful work to aid in winning the war. Present sir, every man of us except about 250,000 privileged citizens who are engaged in wasting our precious and scanty food supply, men who belong, sir, with the rats you mention.

I do not ask wartime prohibition today. It is coming fast. But with the food shortage impossible to over estimate, with every loyal citizen willing to add to the limit in saving wheat or anything else you ask, not only until harvest, but more—until peace is won, we urgently demand as an emergency measure that you stop by national order the use of wheat in the degree now in force in Oregon, Montana, Texas and Idaho—all minor states in point of population, in every other state of the Union. Don't tell us to eat the barley so the brewer cannot get it, but you get the barley from the brewer where you have allowed it to be locked up and give us a chance at it. We will not quibble with you over the price of substitutes today. Just for two months take from the brewer the barley, corn and rice and the sugar used in fermented liquors and after harvest or when we get back the wheat again let the brewer open if you wish, we will arrange his funeral later.

A national crisis demands nation wide measures. Make it a wheatless nation and a barleyless brewery until harvest.
