"BIG STICK" FOUND

Captain Thinks His Mast Will Be Largest Stepped.

What "Capt." Bob McIntosh says will be the longest mast of the same diameter stepped in a vessel in the United States is one selected to replace the foremast of the auxiliary schooner Margaret, which will be 29 inches in diameter at the deck, and at the top, 100 feet above the deck, the diameter is to be 28 inches. The exact length of the mast from the "step" will be 129 feet 10 inches. There were masts shipped by "Captain" McIntosh recently to South Africa that were 130 feet long, but of less diameter. The foremast now in place aboard the Margaret has a diameter of 26 inches and is the same length as the new one.

For two weeks a search was made for a stick from which the mast could be fashioned and when it was about concluded the only means would be to go into the timber and select one, the specimen now here was found in a log raft. It is at the St. Johns dry dock at Portland, Ore., and will be fashioned by hand.

Marseilles Population Grows.

M. Marty, prefect of Marseilles, announced at a recent public dinner in honor of M. Boulsson, commissioner of mercantile marine, that Marseilles, which before the war had a population of 660,000, now has 977,000 and soon will have 1,000,000.

U. S. AIRPLANES ACTIVE IN TOUL

Pursuit Squadron Engages in Number of Clashes.

MORE VICTORIES ARE SCORED

Tennessee Aviator Achieves Success in Unequal Combat—Brings Down One Hun and Evades Three Enemy Planes When His Machine Gun Became Jammed—Auto Racer Scores Another.

An American aerial pursuit squadron is operating over the American sector northwest of Toul. It is permitted to announce. All the pilots whose air exploits have been recorded up to this time belong to this squadron, which has a special insignia. The squadron is flying in Neuport chasing machines.

The first victories, in which the American squadron brought down two German machines, were gained the day after they took up flying on this sector. The occupants of the German machines were made prisoners.

Other machines, aside from those in this squadron, also are flying on the Toul front. The fact that an American squadron was there could not be mentioned previously because it was not desired that the Germans should know of the fact.

But after there have been so many fights at close range and two American machines have fallen it is believed certain the enemy knows an American squadron is operating on this front. There is also the fact that Capt. James Norman Hall has fallen behind the German lines and been made a prisoner.

Downs German Airplane.

Lieut. Edward Buford, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn., was officially credited with shooting down a German airplane over St. Mihiel on May 22.

Buford while patrolling encountered two German pursuit planes. The fighting continued only a few minutes. Lieut. Buford attacking one of the German planes, which tried to lead him into the fire from the other. Suddenly Lieutenant Buford looked overboard and saw two more Germans coming down from out of the clouds for him. He took a dive, all of the Germans diving at the same time, and when he came up he had one of the enemy planes in front of him. Buford began firing with his machine gun, causing his adversary to disappear in a nose dive. Although he was sure he had hit the German, it was not until later that the victory was confirmed.

A few minutes later Lieutenant Buford by maneuvering managed to get behind two of the remaining three machines and opened fire, but his machine gun jammed. As he was unable to use his weapon he started in a series of skilful dives and turns and was successful in shaking off the three enemy planes.

Lieut. Edward Rickenbacher, the former automobile racer, has added another aerial victory to his record. Announcement was made that it had been confirmed that the lieutenant shot down a German biplane in the neighborhood of Thiaucourt on May 22. The fight took place 5,500 meters in the air.

Gets on Enemy's Tail.

With another pilot Lieutenant Rickenbacher engaged in a long fight with two enemy machines. Rickenbacher finally got on the tail of one machine and fired more than a score of shots at short range. The enemy machine went into a spinning nose dive, but it was uncertain whether it hit the ground, so the lieutenant was not credited with a victory at the time. Positive confirmation that the machine crashed to the ground has since been obtained.

No confirmation is obtainable concerning the German report that three American airplanes have been shot down in the Lys region.

Old English Furniture.

That fine old furniture is yet found in Britain in many unexpected places is said to be largely due to the stirring up of the country that was given by the great exhibition at London of 1861. This was soon after the development of the railway system in England, and there flocked to London, a large number of squires and their wives. A new world had opened to the country dames. The new things had a wonderful fascination for them. On returning home they got rid of much of their old furniture and bought new. Much of the old furniture found its way to second-hand shops, and was sold to poor folk, who could not afford to buy new. This accounts for the finding today of much good old furniture in small houses in provincial towns and among country people.—Indianapolis News.

Not to Be Taken In.

SOLDIER FINDS HE IS PALLBEARER TO BROTHER

Learns Identity When Chaplain Reads Name During Funeral Services in France.

One of the most pathetic instances of the war, so far as America is concerned, occurred in a little cemetery to the rear of the Picardy front recently when an American soldier acting as a pallbearer at the funeral of several American dead discovered his own brother, Joseph Ash, among the dead. The brothers, members of different companies, had met only the day before at the front. Joseph remained there and was mortally wounded that night, dying soon afterward. His brother was ordered to the rear lines with a party of woodchoppers. The woodchoppers were working near the cemetery at the time of the funeral and the chaplain asked them to be pallbearers. In the midst of the services the chaplain read the name of Joseph Ash. The brother, who stood with bared head in the small group of soldier mourners, reeled forward, his eyes filled with tears, and he exclaimed, "My brother! Oh, my brother!"

The chaplain, not understanding, stepped up and placed his arm around the young man's shoulder, saying, "We are all brothers, my boy." The soldier looked at the coffin and shook his head.

"The Germans will pay for your blood, Joe," he said, and then it was that the chaplain and the others around him understood and they led him away.
