R.W. DE WITT ESCAPES FROM COUNTY JAIL

The Josephine county jail was the scene last night of another successful jail break, when R. W. DeWitt, who was held to await the action of the grand jury, escaped through a hole in the brick wall. DeWitt is the man held for the robbery of the Boswell mine near Takilma early in May, when about \$6,000 in gold was stolen.

Sheriff Lewis states that DeWitt had outside help, a confederate digging a hole in the brick wall on the Fifth street side of the jail, entering the corridor, picking the lock to the "tank," where DeWitt and four other men were confined, and releasing DeWitt. When the jail was opened this morning everything about the lock was found to be in order, but one prisoner was gone. The other prisoners say that they were awakened shortly before daylight by a scratching noise and the falling of brick, but they were afraid to make any outcry for fear of being shot in their cages.

Up to the present time there is no clue as to the whereabouts of DeWitt.

The Best young people were on a picnic and they were badly stung by yellow jackets and it is thought by some that the poison of the sting may have contributed to the sickness. Miss Best, however, spoke of the trouble in the morning before they left on the picnic.

Miss Best was 24 years old, having been born in Elkhorn, Manitoba, in 1894. Ten years ago the family moved to Grants Pass to make their home. Miss Best was a graduate of the Grants Pass high school in 1912. In 1916 she took a position as stenographer in the law office of Chickering & Gregory in San Francisco, and has been home on her vacation for the past two weeks.

Besides her parents there are two sisters, Ruby and Violet, and three brothers, Eric, Noble and Garnet, the latter in the U. S. navy, now in the Philippine Islands.

The funeral will be held at Bethany Presbyterian church Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. L. Myron Boozer conducting the service. The interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

GUARD AGAINST LATE APPEARANCE OF MOTH

W. S. Brown, assistant field horticulturist for the O. A. C., has been in the county for several days and has completed demonstration work at the River Banks orchard, the Homewood farm and the Rogue River Orchard company, spraying for the second brood of codling moth.

Mr. Brown states that the first brood was so uneven as to time that the second brood will probably do likewise, and it is important that fruitgrowers shall be on their guard against late infection by the moth. If the growers find worms appearing and doing damage to fruit from the middle to the last of August they should spray again with arsenate of lead.

YANKS STAND LIKE STONE

The announcement of the war office Sunday adds that the villages of Anthenay and Olney-Et-Viplaine on the east flank lying to the southwest of Rheims have been occupied.

In the Champagne a number of German attacks were repulsed by the French.

Since the opening of the artillery bombardment on July 18, the day of the French counter offensive on the front between the Aisne and the Marne, our tanks have taken more or less part in the battle. After piercing the enemy lines and enabling the infantry to enter the break they have not ceased to accompany or precede the troops.

Throughout the battle the tanks have given proof of their ability to maneuver and of their incomparable audacity. The crews drove the tanks into the hottest parts of the battle and reloaded from no obstacles. They attacked the centers of resistance and the batteries of the enemy under terrific fires from machine guns and special German cannon.

Their gallantry attained the greatest results. One tank accounted for 15 or 20 German machine guns. Some of the tanks attacked the German batteries, putting the gunners out of action and insuring the capture of the cannon and material.
