TO

BRITONS AND CANADIANS IN THE UNITED STATES

On July 31st the recruiting Convention between Great Britain and the United States will come into force and the period for voluntary enlistment terminates on September 28th.

During this period of sixty days, all Britons and Canadians between the ages of twenty and forty-four both inclusive, have an opportunity of offering their services to their own countries at a time when the services of every man are urgently needed.

For sixty days all British subjects between the above ages will be exempt from the American draft and can enlist at any recruiting depot of the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission regardless of the fact that they may have taken out first United States citizenship papers, or have been classified in Class 1.

During this period of sixty days all Britons and Canadians of twenty years of age and those between the ages of thirty-one and forty-four inclusive will be required to register on a date fixed by Proclamation by the President and thirty days after registration, men of these ages will be liable to the American draft.

On September 28th, the period within which you can volunteer expires and thereafter you will be liable to draft into the United States Army.

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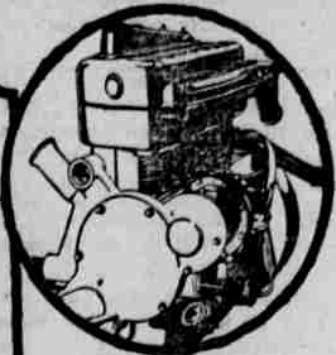
