EVANS CREEK FARMERS RAISING MANY BEANS

Evans creek valley farmers are
solving the problem of how to get
rich. First, they install an irriga-
tion system—and then they plant
beans. About 400 acres of beans in
that valley this year promise great
results, notwithstanding the low
temperature the first month of the
growing season. Of course, no at-
tempt is made to produce beans or
any other staple crop in quantities
on unirrigated lands.

Last year the yield per acre was
about \$150. The price is higher this
year and the yield will be about the
same. The bean fields of that val-
ley resemble the great fortune-mak-
ing bean areas of California. It cer-
tainly is reassuring to see the irriga-
tion streams of irrigation water
ribboning the rows of rich green for
half a mile in length. Careful tillage
is one of the secrets of success in
the bean field. The Evans creek
farmers have found the secret.

Between \$60,000 and \$70,000 will
be realized by the farmers of that
progressive valley from their bean
crop this year; and they will lose no
time in looking for a market for the
product. With irrigation covering
the entire valley area, they could
easily produce half a million dollars' worth of beans annually and not in-
terfere with acreage in abundance
for other staple crops. Alfalfa is
yielding excellently under the stim-
ulus of irrigation and corn is doing
equally well. All varieties of vege-
tables are looking fine and a splen-
did crop is promised. But the bean
crop appears to be taking the lead
in that section, for it has been found
that the soil there is peculiarly
adapted to that product.

ENLISTMENTS FOR THE STUDENTS RESERVE

The government has issued a call
for 25,000 young women to join the
United States student nurse reserve
to hold themselves in readiness to
train for service as nurses.

The great need of such a large
number of our trained nurses across
seas has made it necessary to call up-
on our young women to go in train-
ing for nurses, both military and for
home use.

The call is for women between the
ages of 19 and 35.

A recruiting station has been es-
tablished in the public library, with
Miss Barnes in charge, by the city
women's committee. Council of De-
fense, where anyone desiring infor-
mation may get it, and blanks are on
hand to be filled out by the appli-
cant.

Josephine county has been asked to
furnish five women for this training
as our quota.

Ever since the days of Florence
Nightingale the nursing profession
has been one of especial honor. It
was never so honorable as it is to-
day.

The training schools to which
these young women will enter are
the very best in the United States,
and students when finished, will
have acquired a profession for life,
and one that can always command a
good salary.

The young men of our county
have more than gone "over the top"
in every call and now let our young
women show that we know how to
answer the government's call to the
women of the county.

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

Plant Diseases
E. C. Owens from the Agricultural
college is with us for a few days.
We are making a study and a limited
survey of plant disease as are af-
fecting some of our most important
crops.

A good many bean fields have
been visited and so far every one of
them have been pretty seriously af-
fected with a comparatively new dis-
ease, known as the bean mosaic.
We had this trouble last year but it
was not so widely distributed as it
is this year. Neither was it very
serious last year. It is too early yet
to say what effect it will have on
the present crop, but indications are
that it will diminish the yield con-
siderably.

It is recognized by the crinkled ap-
pearance of the leaves and the ap-
pearance of mottled dark and light
green on the leaves. On holding the
leaves up toward a strong light fre-
quently there will be seen spots
almost transparent.

Dry weather seems to be favorable
for its development and it is much
more severe on land that has not
been irrigated.

But little is known about treat-
ment for it but the indications are
that plenty of irrigation will help to
overcome it.

It is not yet known whether it is
transmitted through seed harvested
from affected plants or not, but it is
a safe plan if you have some beans
that are not affected to save them
for the next years planting and not
take chances.
