THE EASTERN FRONT

That the eastern front will be reconstituted in the spring, that crippled Germany will have to fight from both sides of her worn and hungry land, is a growing belief.

The various anti-Bolshevik parties seem to be gathering together for the purpose of defense. The Czech-Slovaks are admitted by the Berlin Tageblatt to have increased from 7,500 to 30,000 and to be getting daily reinforcements of Serbians, Cossacks and counter-revolutionists. As the Hageblatt is naturally not anxious to advertise enemy strength, its figures may be taken as extremely conservative.

A Moscow dispatch reports that Japanese advance troops are in touch with the Czech-Slovaks. British troops which landed at Vladivostok have proceeded to the Ussuri river front, and are being welcomed by Czech-Slovaks and natives both.

The party of the social revolution, trying to take Jaroslav, met defeat, but not before the Red Guard had suffered severe losses. The town was finally turned over to the Germans—an open acknowledgement of the connection between Hun and Bolshevik.

Lenine and Trotzky are said to be on the run. The social revolutionary party, which is becoming pro-ally and will welcome the allied troops, is gaining power everywhere. Moscow and Petrograd are expected to fall in line with it soon.

Germany is manifestly worried by the new developments. And justly so. For the Russian people are beginning to find Germany out. And up to date, every country which has come to any true knowledge of Germany's purpose and methods has fallen swiftly into the allied line. Excepting Holland and Switzerland, of course. They hold off because they know too well what happens to children at the hands of the Hun in power. Nobody would be surprised to see them come in at the finish when they think it safe.

With the strength of the Czech-Slovaks, the organizing power of the Japanese, the moral and military support of the western allies, and the awakening consciousness of the Russian people working together, Germany may well be awake with anxiety over the east.

the war in the spring of 1917, many big problems had to be faced. Among them was the need for castor oil for lubricating rotary airplane engines. Millions of gallons were needed as soon as possible, and the total available supply was then only 700,000 gallons.

All through the south and southwest a campaign was organized for the promotion of castor-bean growing. School children became interested and farmers returned to an almost abandoned industry. According to the latest estimate, 105,000 acres of this valuable bean were planted in eight southern states and Cuba.

The oil from this vast territory will be available in the coming fall. The average yield is said to be 20 gallons of first grade oil to the acre. A poorer quality of oil is made from the residue, and after all the oil is extracted a fertilizer is made of the remaining castor pomace.

The castor bean crop is one that pays. Even in normal times large quantities of the oil were needed in the manufacture of inks, soaps, dyes, artificial leather and fly paper. The increased demand due to airplane needs is not going to fall off after the war if present prospects are realized. Airplanes for mail and transportation uses will be as common in the future as battle and observation planes are now.
