### CITY COUNCIL MEETS IN REGULAR SESSION

The city council met in regular session last night, allowed regular monthly bills, and transacted some other business.

After some discussion it was decided to permit the city library to use the east end of the council room in the city hall, the present quarters of the library being too small for practical use.

The council also let bids for the winter's wood supply at the hall, the contract going to H. H. McClung and J. F. Spalding. The price to be paid is \$6 per cord, but when the freight, drayage and sawing and splitting bills are added to this it will cost the city about \$8.75 per cord. This is for the best dry oak wood.

The council accepted the new fire pump which was recently installed and which the firemen have lately been testing. It was found entirely satisfactory. The price of the pump is \$1,875, which will be paid in monthly installments of \$100.

The new Ford chemical truck now in use at the fire station is all paid for. The truck fitted up complete cost \$1,333.84.

### POTTERY SPECIMENS ON DISPLAY AT DEMARAY'S

The teachers' training school, which has been in session for the past three weeks, closes tonight, after a most successful term. During the course it was demonstrated by the class in pottery that Josephine county has commercial pottery clays in abundance. Specimens of the work of the class will be on exhibition in the Demaray drug store window over Sunday. These pieces were made by the students and were burned in the kiln which was constructed for the purpose at the high school.

### COMMANDS AMERICAN FORCES IN ITALY



**Maj. Gen. C. G. Treat, commander of the American army in Italy, whose readiness to go into action on the Italian front has been announced by General March, chief of staff. The troops received a great ovation when they paraded through the streets of Turin and Milan, according to an official dispatch from Rome. American soldiers have already distinguished themselves in Italy, our flyers having done great work in the memorable battle of the Piave, when the Austrian army was routed.**

### "Plantations."

The word plantation is used principally in the Southern states, where it originated in old slavery times to designate a farm cultivated by negroes, as a cotton plantation or a sugar plantation. In Maine it has a distinctive meaning, representing a form of government smaller than a township. In that state most of the functions of local government are performed by the town or township. In addition to 17 cities and 306 towns, Maine has 75 plantations and 131 unorganized places under the names of plantations, grants, surpluses and gores. A surplus is a small territorial division consisting of an irregular tract laid off by state authority. A gore is a triangular piece of land smaller than a surplus.
