GEN. MARCH PLEASED WITH PROGRESS OF WAR

Washington, Sept. 7.—The situation on the western front, General March told the senate military committee, is more satisfactory today than at any time for months. Good progress has been made and the outlook is bright.

At no point are the allies more than 12 miles from the Hindenburg line, while the upper part of the line has been pierced by the British. About 10,000 Americans are now with the British forces.
