Austria Duped by Germany as to Ukrainian Stores, Is Cry of People.

Starvation reigns in Vienna, according to a press telegram from Budapest, where Mayor Body convoked the municipal food commission and asked It to send food to Vienna. The mayor also published an appeal in which he asked the people of Budapest to re-nounce one day's ration a week for two months. If this was done 50 carloads of grain could be sent to Vienna.

The German press charges Count Czernin and the Austrian press with creating an optimism as to food condi-tions for which there was no founda-tion in fact.
