HUNGRY VIENNA IS BEGGING FOR FOOD

Austria Duped by Germany as to Ukrainian Stores, is Cry of People.

Starvation reigns in Vienna, according to a press telegram from Budapest, where Mayor Body convoked the municipal food commission and asked it to send food to Vienna. The mayor also published an appeal in which he asked the people of Budapest to renounce one day's ration a week for two months. If this was done 50 carloads of grain could be sent to Vienna, the mayor adds.

The German press charges Count Czernin and the Austrian press with creating an optimism as to food conditions for which there was no foundation in fact. Vienna had hoped to get vast quantities of flour from the Ukraine and none came. Czernin is accused of overstating the possible results of the Ukrainian agreement.

It seems Czernin tried to lull the people into contentedness by telling them huge supplies would be on the way from the Ukraine in the near future. When these promises could not be fulfilled the bread ration had to be halved in Vienna. Germany, too, had to reduce its daily bread ration.

At the same time Germany did send some grain to Vienna. Bavaria sent trains of grain to the Tyrol. At the same time Austrian newspapers were charging Germany with having scooped the Ukrainian stores, although it had promised they would be preserved for Austria.
