147 SHIPS IN TWO YEARS OUTPUT OF OREGON YARDS

Salem, Sept. 17.—Shipyards of Oregon from July 1, 1916, to July 1, 1918, constructed 147 Wooden and steel ships for private and government contract. The total tonnage was 604,933 and the value \$64,620,-600, according to statistics prepared by Professor J. O. Hall for the biennial report of State Labor Commissioner Hoff.

In addition, his figures show that there are now under construction 127 ships which will represent a total value of \$84,525,089. Eightytwo of these are wooden ships, totaling 281,470 tons of a value of \$34. 555,769, and 37 are steel, with a tonnage of 253,700 of a value of \$43,660,000. - These are being constructed under government contract Under private contract eight steel ships are being constructed of a tonnage of 59,800, and a value of \$6, 309,320.
