OREGON WILL BE OVER TOP

Portland, Sept. 28.—Fifteen counties of Oregon are over the top and more than 120 towns scattered throughout the state have achieved their quotas in the Fourth Liberty loan drive.

Yamhill, Wallowa, Wasco, Washington, Clackamas, Douglas, Deschutes, Coos, Curry and Gilliam went over the top yesterday. State showed a remarkable spurt with many of the communities still to be heard from. Showing was considered very satisfactory by State Director John L. Elberidge.

Some of the large cities which passed the 100 per cent mark yesterday are Albany, Marshfield, North Bend, The Dalles and Forest Grove. Many towns stand 75 per cent subscribed and may be reported over the top in the early hours of today.

Portland's city campaign yesterday was feverish with its intensity, with flying squadrons returning double subscriptions from many sources. The campaign yesterday developed to the point where slackers were made mighty uncomfortable. Special committees made it very plain that direction of duty lay in one way only—to all those whom the committee felt had not done their part.

Portland is going to clean it up in a hurry, and is not going to do it in any faltering manner. It is spending every effort to put the burden where it belongs. The campaign was not without its exciting moments, one such being when a great war balloon, "Blimp" as it is called, on the western front broke away and sailed west to the Pacific. This balloon was preparing to make a surprise attack on the city and was being filled with gas at works of the Portland Gas Company, in the northern part of the city. When ready to start on its trip to the heart of the city, it broke from its moorings, sailing high into the sky and bearing the query "Are you pledged?" When last seen it was west of southwest by west from Portland and still going for the Pacific ocean.
