New Waterproofing Oil. A French oll for waterproofing leather, cloth, paper and other materials is a mixture of eight parts of amyl acetate and four of castor oil, with one part of sulphur chloride stirred into it. Though this form a jelly, giving off hydrochloric acid, it liquefles after being kept tightly cov-ered a few days, and, the acid being then neutralized with barium carbonate, gives a coloriess solution on filtering. To make a varnish, nitrocellulose is dissolved in the liquid after the addition of alcohol or benzine,
