The German position on the western front is not considered perilous, although at certain points the everchanging front may render some small positions dangerous at times.

This view, which has been held by many experts for some time, has been strengthened by the German retreat to the Hunding line, which is declared one of the most successful retreats of the war from the enemy viewpoint.

With the Americans and French pushing hard on this front, the Germans doubtless were forced to retreat faster than they had planned, but they lost comparatively few prisoners and guns for such a large operation.
