For superintendent public instruction, J. A. Churchill gets 1,363, while his opponent, Inez Augusta Lusk, gets but 180. For attorney general, George M. Brown gets the vote over E. L. Cannon by 1,313, against 145; and for commissioner of labor statistics, C. H. Gram receives 1,303 against August Nikula, 123.

The total county vote gives the election of George Lewis for sheriff over his opponent, C. E. McLane by 1,205 to 648; and to Eugene L. Coburn for county clerk by 954 against 891 for Jennie J. Moss. George S. Calhoun also wins over Mrs. Amy Booth Holmes by 1,153 to 713.

In the city election there was no contest for the office of mayor and councilmen and C. H. Demaray was elected mayor. T. P. Cramer and L. A. Launer were elected councilmen for the first ward, E. H. Balsiger and C. F. Nutting councilmen for ward 2, Wm. Bunch and Chas. Burkhalter for ward No. 3, and F. O. Wilcox and S. M. Leonard for Ward No. 4.

81 Cases in Medford—

There have been reported authentically that there are 81 cases in Medford with six new cases yesterday. The Medford doctors are also attending 20 cases in the country.—Tribune.

Henry A. Whipple Dies—

Henry A. Whipple, aged 43, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Whipple of this city, died at Bend, Ore., on Sunday, November 3, of pneumonia, following an attack of Spanish influenza. Mr. Whipple was born in Iowa and came to the coast in 1884. He had been a resident of Grants Pass for 20 years, having gone to Bend to work in the logging camps only a few months ago. The funeral was held on Monday, Rev. W. C. Stewart, of Bend, conducting a private service, and the remains were interred in the Pilot Butte cemetery. W. R. Whipple, who went to Bend and arrived before his son's death, returned to Grants Pass this morning.
