He is not for the eight-hour "basic" day-that is, eight hours taken as a mere basis for reckoning a day's pay, though the working day itself may be longer. It is not good policy he insists, to give what may seem a fair day's wages for the first eight hours and then keep the employe and-a-half for over-time and double forces. time Sundays and holidays." 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
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
