Castanets.

Castanets are musical instruments of percussion in the form of two hollow nut-shells, which are bound to-gether by a band fastened on the thumb, and struck by the fingers to produce a thrilling sound in keeping with the rhythm of the music. The castanets were introduced into Spain by the Moors, where they retain the name of castanulas, from their resem-
blance to the form of the chestnut. The castanets were once much used in the ballet and in the opera.
