Said to Oppose Creation of Reconstruction Commission, Either Executive or Congressional

Washington, Nov. 20 .- Democra-President Wilson last night for two hours left the White House with the Harney, Linn, Marion and Union, impression that the president now plans to remain in France indefinitely, or at least until the major portion of the work of the peace conference has been completed.

The plan for a league of nations was another subject to which the president was said to have given much study. He was understood to regard this essential for the maintenance of the peace of the world.

During his absence from the United States the president plans to continue to exercise all the functions of his office. He will keep in communication with Washington by wireless while at sea, and by cable, and if necessary by dispatch boats while he is abroad.

While in France the president was said to plan transaction of any necessary executive business in the American embassy. Technically he then would be on American soil. Should he visit London or any of the other allied capitals the embassies there would become his executive headquarters.

London, Nov. 20-Music has been found to be beneficial in the treatment of soldiers suffering from shell shock and now singing is to be tried on a systematic scale with the approval of the army authorities.

An effort is being made to organize regular singing training in all hospitals where there are shell shock cases.
