GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE ALL SALMON, FOR CASH

Washington, Nov. 21.—Seven million dollars in government gold is to be distributed in the north-west at once for salmon. Final prices are not fixed, but will be left to the experts who will be sent out by the federal trade commission.

Pending the investigation as to final prices the government will advance \$7.75 per case for red salmon and \$6 flat per case for pink salmon. This order is placed by the subsistence department of the army but, inasmuch as all prices are the same for allied and for civilian use in the United States, this means the whole pack will be taken at these prices.
