Casualty Lists—

The Courier has been asked a number of times why the casualty lists are still being published after the fighting has ceased. The answer is that lists are made up by the government and sent to newspapers for publication as fast as the lists can be compiled, the names secured and verified. The list published on any day is not the list of casualties for that day, but they probably occurred a month previous. It is a gigantic undertaking to compile lists from reports sent in from all sections of the front, where one division may be in action continuously for eight to ten days with no opportunity to report and certainly no possibility of turning in an accurate report. Lists will probably continue to come in for another month.
