Notice is hereby given, that the county court will consider bids for the maintenance of the poor of Josephine county, Oregon, for a period of one year from January 1, 1919, according to certain terms and conditions, to-wit:

All bids must specify the exact amount per capita per month.

The successful bidder to provide the necessary food, clothing and to take care of the inmates whether sick or well, and if any inmates are sick, they are to be provided with all the necessary nursing as required by the county physician.

The county will furnish nothing besides the necessary medical attention and medicine.

The county home will be furnished if desired, no rent will be charged for the use of the same, but an inventory of all furniture, dishes, and fixtures, etc., is to be made before the successful bidder takes charge of things, and he must see that all things inventoried are returned to the county at the termination of the lease, in as good condition as when they were received, with the exception of the usual wear and tear.

If the poor are taken care of at any other place other than in the county home, the successful bidder must provide all the necessary bedding, etc., and the county not to be required to buy any of said goods purchased at the termination of the contract.

The county court shall have the right at all times to inspect said place, or home, where the inmates are being cared for, to ascertain whether they are receiving the attention required.

A bond of \$4,000 will be required for the faithful performance of the contract.

All bids must be filed on or before 10 o'clock a. m. of the 5th day of December A. D. 1918.

The court reserves the right to reject any or all bids or award the contract according to the best interests of the county.

PUT VEGETABLES IN ROOT CELLAR

Will Prove an Economy and Prevent Waste of Food Which Is a War Measure.

STORAGE IS OF IMPORTANCE

Makes It Possible to Reduce Cost of Menu Materially and There is Much Satisfaction in Having Good Supply in Winter.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

For those persons who are fortunate enough to control land for the growing of vegetables in sufficient quantity for the needs of the family, storage will prove an economy. Likewise, it will often prove an economy to grow late vegetables to store. Home storage is of importance at all times, but especially so if the price of suitable containers for use in canning and drying is high.

Reduce Menu Cost.

Crops of suitable sorts that mature at a season when they can be preserved by storing should be kept in their natural condition instead of being canned or dried. Not only is it possible to reduce the cost of the menu materially by growing and storing vegetables for home use, but the satisfaction of having a supply of fresh vegetables near at hand, so that, regardless of markets and winter temperatures, the list may be varied, is something that cannot be measured in dollars and cents.

A half-acre garden, if cared for properly, will produce far more vegetables than the average family can consume during the maturing period of the crops. Only a small portion of the garden should be devoted to those vegetables which must be used as soon as they reach maturity. Beets, late cabbage, carrots, celery, onions, parsnips, potatoes, sweet potatoes, salsify, and turnips may be stored in their natural condition, and should be grown to the extent of the family needs for storage for winter use. Beans of various kinds, including the Limas, may be stored dry. The successful storage of vegetables is not at all difficult; in fact, good storage facilities already exist in most homes, it

being only necessary to make use of the cellar, the attic, a large closet, or other parts of the dwelling, depending upon the character of the product to be stored.

Suitable Cellars. A cool, well-ventilated cellar under the dwelling offers good conditions for the storage of vegetables. Many cellars are not well suited for storing vegetables because of poor insulation or lack of ventilation. Cellars containing a furnace for heating the dwelling usually are too warm and too dry for the storage of root crops. It is often possible, however, to partition off a room either in one corner or at one end of the cellar where the temperature may be controlled by means of outside windows. At least one window is necessary, and two or more are desirable for admitting light and ventilation.
