SOLDIERS UNDER

General Land Office Officials Say Special Privileges Will Be Granted Soldiers

general land office, has sent new instructions to the various land offices throughout the United States. Following is a gist of the new act passed by congress:

That any person, under the age

of 21, who has served or shall hereafter serve in the army of the United States during the present emergency shall be entitled to the same rights under the homestead and other land and mineral entry laws, general or special, as those over 21 years of age now possess under said laws: Provided.
