LICENSES FOR POWDER ARE STILL REQUIRED

The following recent rulings of the director of the bureau of mines at Washington, D. C., will be of interest to many:

"As the season is at hand when the farmer wants saltpeter for curing meats it is timely, and the rulings are as follows:

"1. All regulations relating to ingredients not used or intended to be used in the manufacture of explosives are revoked and no further license of such ingredients will be required.

"2. All regulations relating to fireworks are revoked and no further license of fireworks will be required.

"3. All regulations relating to platinum, iridium and palladium and compounds thereof are revoked and no further license of platinum, iridium and palladium will be required.

"May I state that licenses for explosives, such as blasting powder, dynamite, etc., are still required under the federal explosives regulation act as in the past. Licenses for the purchase of ingredients, other than if wanted for the manufacture of explosives, are no longer required."

Six months ago he nearly lost a toe in contact with a bandsaw, which kept him in three months, with infection, and now he is laid up with arms and legs broken, according to the following letter received today by his mother, Mrs. L. C. Miller, under date of November 3rd:

"I did not write you last week. I had a little accident and am now back in the base hospital 27 with a few legs, arms, etc., broken. Nothing serious or permanent, but I will be laid up some little time. I expect to be shipped back to America before long.

"I got tangled up in some machinery and broke my left arm twice and both legs. No compound fracture and no parts missing. All set and feeling well."

MRS. ADDIE WATSON DIES OF INFLUENZA

Mrs. Addie Watson died in this city Monday night at 11:50, of pneumonia following influenza, at the age of 46 years. Mrs. Watson has been ill since Thanksgiving. She leaves one son, R. H. Watson, and one daughter, Mrs. J. Culp, both of whom reside here. Funeral services will be held tomorrow at the Hall chapel and interment will take place in the Granite Hill cemetery.
