NAVY EQUAL TO ANY BY 1925 IS URGED

Washington, Dec. 12.—Admiral Badger, of the general board of the navy, appearing before the house naval committee, urged sufficient appropriations to provide a navy for the United States by 1925 as large as that of any other country.

The Admiral stated that 150 German and seven Austrian submarines had been sunk in the war prior to August. The Germans had built 321 submarines and the Austrians had only 35.

COPPER KING PREPARES TO PUSH WORK AT MINE

H. W. Webber, manager of the Copper King mine near Placer, returned from Seattle this morning. In speaking of operations at the mine, Mr. Webber said:

"Mr. Cowley, president and financier of the mine, is well pleased with the progress of the tunnel and construction work at the mine which has been carried on during the past few months and intends to keep a force of miners busy all winter. Our outside work will consist of sawing about 150,000 feet of dimension lumber to be used for the foundation of the concentration and oil flotation plant. Present tunneling is progressing at the rate of about ten feet per day."

Mr. Webber states that they will begin to ship ore in the early spring if the road can be gotten in condition by that time. "During the past summer we have taken 54 tons of machinery to the mine and have about 100 tons more to be delivered there," says Mr. Webber. "Mr. Dalley has purchased the Blalock placer mine, four miles above the Copper King."

Mr. Bramwell, president of the local commercial club, has been consulted through correspondence with Mr. Cowley, who has made public the future work of the company, to the end that the road question can be settled and construction work begun as soon as possible.

Mr. Webber says that there are evidences of much mining activity in the Grave Creek district the coming year and that they are anxious to have the road matter settled as they wish to make Grants Pass their permanent headquarters.
