London, Nov. 30-(Correspondence of Associated Press)-A vast chorus of siren whistles from a thousand fighting ships split the air when the British Grand Fleet received the news of the signing of the suddenly, the great fleet of battleships, cruisers, torpedo destroyers, mine-layers and patrols united in one huge, synchronized diapson that startled the hearers for a radius of a hundred miles. The tremendous sound re-echoed amongst the hills on both shores, awesome in its intensity.
