There is a little girl in Fairbanks, Texas, who raised enough vegetables half-acre garden, to put up 1,080 cans of tomatoes, 150 cans of beans, 60 cans of peas, 78 cans of tomatoes and okra and 50 cans of sweet potatoes, making 1,418 cans altogether. They were of such fine quality, too, that they won praise and prizes in
