JUSTICE TO LABOR

Henry Ford has been lauded by some as a great benefactor to the laboring men because he recently raised their wages, all of which is an illusion. If Mr. Ford can continue to make millions, and he undoubtedly can, he deserves no great credit for paying a decent living wage to those who daily bend their backs in his sweat-shops to grind out more millions for him.

Secretary of Commerce Redfield said in a speech at Atlantic City: "Beware of the temptation to lay rash hands upon wages. Concentrate thought, purpose and effort on output. Find and seize hold of all that science has said or can say concerning industry."

2. If an employe of a shop deals in opium the shopkeeper shall dismiss the man, whose name will be published in the newspapers, so that he will not be able to find employment elsewhere.

3. If a wealthy man be discovered dealing in opium, his name shall be given to the elder of his family, with the request that the guilty person be cast out from the family (one of the greatest of disgraces), and he shall be opposed by all as an alien without mercy.

4. Landlords and landladies shall not rent their houses to opium dealers. If they do, they will be dealt with as if they were the opium dealers themselves.

CHAPLAIN WRITES OF GRANTS PASS SOLDIER

The following letter, written to Rev. Melville T. Wire, of this city, by an army chaplain, explains the manner in which Cuthbert W. Courtney, of this city was wounded. The chaplain is answering a letter for Mr. Courtney written him by Mr. Wire.

Dijon, France, A. P. O. 721, Dec. 15, 1918.

Rev. Melville T. Wire, Grants Pass, Oregon. My Dear Brother Wire:

I had the pleasure, this morning, of meeting one of your loyal friends and parishoners, Cuthbert W. Courtney, who is fighting his way back to health and strength, though it has been a fierce conflict. He was severely wounded as you know, in one of the engagements. His was a thrilling and heroic experience for which he has recently been cited and his name placed on the honor roll. It seems that he was in the signal service and was in company with the captain and five others when the shell struck the place where they were temporarily located, with headquarters. Cuthbert was at the time at the telephone, and while the captain and all in this place were wounded, he was the most severely hurt, but refusing to leave his post, he managed to call up the telephone for the captain, although he was wounded in both legs badly, and in his left shoulder. When the ambulance came he wanted the captain to be taken first but the captain insisted that as Cuthbert was wounded more than the rest, he should be moved first. He does not know what became of the captain. I think it has been 11 weeks now since the engagement, and it may be months before he will be recovered. His spirit is fine, and brave. He speaks so cheerfully of the future and of the home-coming. Your letter was a comfort to him. I read it and enjoyed with him your experience with the trout fishing. His face lighted as he told me just where you were on the river. I am sure such letters cheer him and take his thought from his present surroundings.

"WETS" WILL CARRY THEIR FIGHT TO HIGHEST COURT

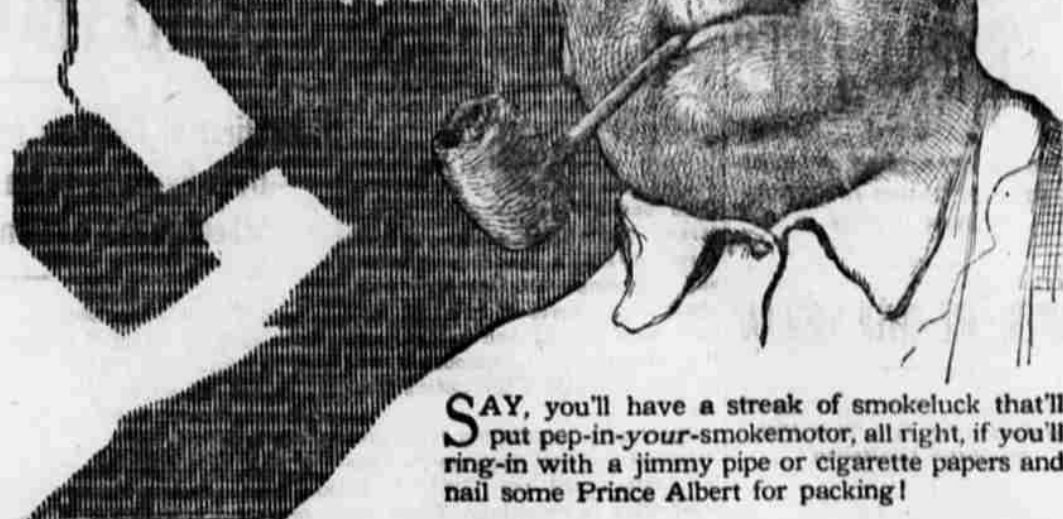
