THREE OLD BATTLERS THROWN IN SCRAP HEAP

Philadelphia, Feb. 22.—Three of the old-time leaders of the American navy have been condemned to the scrap heap. The Indiana, Massachusetts and Iowa, battleships, now in the basin of the Philadelphia navy yard will shortly be destroyed as they have outlived their usefulness. Yet, 25 years ago, they were the equals of anything afloat. The Indiana class of battleship was regarded as a daring experiment. When the Indiana first went to sea all on board were impressed with the feeling that she might turn over in a heavy sea and go to the bottom. Although the old battleships are still serviceable, and they were used in the world war they are obsolete and are therefore destined for the naval morgue.

20 U-BOAT COMMANDERS ARE GUILTY OF MURDER

London, Feb. 22.—Reuter's, Limited, says it learns that the commission inquiring into German submarine activities has sufficient evidence to convict some 20 German submarine commanders, nearly all of whom are in Germany, of murder. Seven commanders in particular have bad records, according to Reuter's advice, and the opinion is expressed that their surrender and trial possibly by an allied naval tribunal should form a clause in the armistice terms.

BERKELEY TRAINED MANY ARMY AVIATORS

Berkeley, Cal., Feb. 22.—The government spent \$417 to train each flying cadet in his ground work at the school of military aeronautics on the University of California campus here, according to figures given out with the formal closing of the school.

Approximately one and a quarter million dollars were spent on the maintenance of the school.

Over 3,000 students graduated from the school prepared to begin actual flying. This number represents about 85 per cent of the entrants, which authorities declare, is a record that is highest in the country.

SENATOR REED TAKES RAP AT PEACE LEAGUE

Washington, Feb. 22.—Senator Reed, of Missouri, democrat, delivered a denunciation of the league of nations plan. He said the free American government would be largely displaced by a government controlled by "European monarchy and Asiatic despots, and that England would dominate the league and that America would be overwhelmingly outvoted."

PENROSE PRESIDENT FOR QUARTER CENTURY

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 22.—The 25th anniversary of the presidency of Stephen B. L. Penrose, of Whiteman college is to be celebrated at the college here on June 7 to 10. One of the features of the program will be a session in charge of the "Yale band" of the 1899, composed of six members of the graduating class of that year in Yale divinity school.
