HIGH SCHOOL NOTES

On Saturday morning, March 1st, the girls' basketball team of Roseburg high school arrived here to play the basketball game scheduled between themselves and the Grants Pass team. They were met by the Grants Pass girls, who took them to the hotel Oxford, and later to the Central school where they spent a short time practicing. At noon they were given a luncheon at the hotel, and later taken for a drive about the city.

The game, which was played in the evening, was an exciting one, the score running up about evenly on both sides. When time was last called, the score was a tie, 16-16. It was agreed to play until the first field basket was made, and this going to the Roseburg team, the game ended with the score of 16-18.

After the game the Oxford management offered the use of their dining room, where the members of the team, and other students danced until 11:30, the music being furnished by Bernice Quinlan. Refreshments were served during the evening.

Physical drill at the high school is continuing, and the pupils are fast gaining skill at their different exercises. Both the boys and the girls are greatly hampered in all their physical work by the absence of a gymnasium in which to practice. The girls are forced to take their exercises in the small space permitted between the desks, and in bad weather the boys must either drill in the rain, or attempt military maneuvers in a narrow hallway.

A gymnasium is a badly needed addition to the high school department, and while it has been almost within reach at different times, it has never yet materialized. The students and other interested parties have not lost hope, however, and one will probably be erected in the near future.

A series of luncheons is being given by the members of the cooking class, as a part of their regular work. There will be three in number, and each of a different type. On Thursday a luncheon was given to the members of the faculty, and later a dinner is to be given to the members of the school board. The girls take their turns as host and hostess, at serving, and remaining in the kitchen. Miss Cornell, as instructor, conducts the work.

The literary society, whose adviser is Miss Dahlberg, is planning a program to be given in the near future. The program will consist of a play, and several other numbers, for which the students are practicing.
