Bees Move 150,000 Tons.

The honey crop of the United States for 1918 having been estimated by the department of agriculture at about 250,000,000 pounds, the American Botanist estimates that as the nectar of flowers does not become honey until worked over and partly evaporated, the bees must move as much as 150, 000 tons of material to produce this crop, exclusive of the honey enten by themselves. Of this product, about one-half is from the nectar of white clover, with two other leguminous plants-alfalfa and sweet clover-as the next important sources.


