IMMEDIATE PAY FOR BARRACKS LUMBER

Corvallis, Ore., Mar. 15.—Lumber companies in Oregon and Washington, which met a war emergency by supplying the Oregon Agricultural college here with 367,000 feet of lumber for constructing barracks, will be reimbursed immediately, it has been announced. President Kerr has sent out letters thanking the firms and stating that it is doubtful if the college could have met the requirements of the government, had the companies failed to deliver the lumber with the understanding that they would be reimbursed on condition the legislature supplied the funds.
