WILL HOLD CLOTHING SCHOOL HERE SATURDAY

Josephine county is to have a clothing school, given under the auspices of the home demonstration section of the County Farm Bureau on Next Saturday, March 22. This school is for the benefit of all who wish to be avall themselves of the opportunity.

Miss Mary Van Kirk, instructor in the Household Arts department of the Oregon Agricultural college, has been secured as instructor for this school. She has had several years of shop work and teaching, a combination of practical and theoretical experience which makes her well qualified for this work.

The morning session will be devoted to a discussion of remodeling of old garments. Made-over garments for grown-ups as well as for the children will be shown. Miss Van Kirk has suggested that the women bring in garments they may have, and she will aid them in planning ways in which they might be remodeled.

The afternoon program will depend upon the wishes of those present at the morning session. Miss Van Kirk will come prepared to give help in many lines such as development of children's clothes and ladies' waists from foundation patterns, fitting and finishing garments, the layette, clothing for the stout figure, textiles, altering and adapting patterns, etc. If you have a problem which you wish solved be sure to be at the morning meeting and suggest it as part of the afternoon program.

The morning session will begin at 10 o'clock and close at 11:30. The afternoon session will be called at 1:15. You will not waste anybody's time if you are late for the meetings will begin just the same. But you will miss some very valuable information. Both sessions will be held in the circuit court room of the courthouse.
