CALKINS REVERSED BY SUPREME COURT

Salem, Ore., Mar. 25.—The supreme court has reversed Judge Calkins, of Jackson county, in the case of the state vs. Huston Cox, the negro porter at the Medford hotel and remanded the case to a trial court. This is one of the most important of prohibition cases. Cox carried liquor from the train to the hotel in a suitcase with other baggage. He was convicted for having liquor in his possession. In dissenting, the opinion of Justice Burnett holds that the prohibition law is emasculated by a majority. The decision was written by Justice Jones.
