get the annual appropriation for roads increased to approximately the amount we should get, but do not get, in taxes. "There is water running down the slopes of Oregon where it has been running without rendering service to man for centuries that, if harnessed, would turn the wheels of industry, provide all motive power for transportation, and also heat and light all factories, mills, office buildings, stores, homes, streets and highways within the state if we had 5,000,000 people in Oregon. While this water is running to waste that should provide electric heat for our homes, we are annually cutting for fuel millions of feet of immature timber that should be saved until it is merchantable. This is little short of a crime. "These are only two of the many things that can be corrected by organized effort. We have long felt the need of concentrated, organized, state-wide power that could speak loud enough to be heard and make some impression on the powers that be; an organization not dominated by any particular part of the state, but in which every community had equal voice; an organization in close touch constantly with the needs of every part of the state; an organization that could give accurate information to the homeseeker and investor concerning any and every corner and community of the state; an organization that could bring every community quickly in line for anything for the good of the whole state or any part of it, and an organization that could promptly bring the whole state like an united army to the defense of any community within her borders that was threatened with injurious legislation or department rulings, or an injustice of any kind from any source. Not exactly a league of nations, but a league of natives. "To meet these great needs the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce was given birth. It will be a strong power for the development of the whole state, if the people support it. It is well born and only needs proper nourishment to make it big and strong and make it perform the work we need done."


