She believes that she is the only woman that was ever allowed to enter the Kiva which is the sacred place where the snakes are washed and kept in readiness for their annual snake dance.

purpose: First, a building program for the erection of public buildings, including college structures at Corvallis and Eugene, and armories and hospitals in different parts of the state; second, a land settlement program, especially for the benefit of returned soldiers and sailors; and third, a land reclamation program in cooperation with the United States government, which would be of especial benefit to the sections of Southern Oregon needing irrigation.

"With a big, constructive program such as is involved in this bonding act," Prof. Reed declared, "Oregon will find that she does not need a Mayor Hanson to put down incipient bolshevism. Such destructive disturbances will subside in the face of the leadership of sound statesmanship and active business that should follow the wide execution of these bills when they become laws."

He pointed out to the situation in North Dakota, where the non-partisan league now dominates, as a warning instance of how the leadership of the people passes to demagogues when the people ask in vain of their political leaders for progressive, constructive legislation. For years, he declared, the farmers of North Dakota asked for moderate, but greatly needed reforms and forward-looking legislation. Failing to get this, they fell in line with the extravagances of Townleyism. Oregon legislators steer a wide, free course away from such reefs and shoals as this by providing a big program on which all can unite for the up-building of a wonderfully resourceful state.

After Prof. Reed's address Mrs. Atkins, national W. C. T. U. worker, was given the floor. She was advertised to speak on the "Americanization of Foreigners," but for 20 minutes she reviewed the history of the W. C. T. U. and its work and told of the work yet to be done. Mrs. Atkins is a rapid and fluent speaker, and had a part in the Oregon prohibition campaign in 1912. She gave it as her opinion that any man who lifts an arm against the prohibition amendment is a traitor to the flag and the people.

BELGIANS PROUD OF CITIES

In Their Centers of Industry They See Embodied the Glorious History of the Past.

No man shall say we love our land less than a Frenchman loves France, less than a Belgian loves his native land. We have our holy cities, Winchester and Canterbury, and a hundred more whose old names are dear to speak. Yet I believe, writes "Londoner" in the London Evening News, that the Belgian has a patriotism of the city, of the town, which we never had.

The story of that love for the city is all the history of Belgium. The history of the freedom and the wealth and the ancient arts of Belgium is in the history of Antwerp and Bruges, of Brussels and Ghent, and Louvain and Ypres. It begins with the building of the town wall, with the market that grows up behind the shelter of walls and armed gates, with the raising of the tall belfry, the town's pride, and the hanging of the bells.

If you were a tourist who could see the glory of old Flanders and Brabant, you would look not at the cathedral or the church, although Belgium has many noble old churches, but at the town hall and the belfry. The like of them is not in any other country.
