OPPOSED OIL PIPE LINES

Teamsters Defeated Proposition Which Had Its Origin in Brain of Heman Jones, Pennsylvanian.

It was an American, Heman Jones of Erie, Pa., who first conceived the idea of the construction of an oil pipe line. It was to be of wood four inches in diameter, but was not executed. A year later, in 1862, a bill was introduced into the legislature authorizing a pipe line from Oil Creek to Kittanning, Pa., (the state in which oil was first discovered), but it got no further, through the opposition of 4,000 teamsters. In fact, for some years the teamsters made impossible the success of the pipe lines. They were doing very well out of the existing methods of transportation, earning \$10 to \$30 a day, and they viewed with vindictive disfavor the loss of dollars and weekly revelries. Both in 1863 and in 1865 the teamsters wrought havoc on the two pipe lines constructed in those years. Eventually progress gained the day, and many lines were laid, including one 102 miles long in 1880. It was not, however, till John D. Rockefeller and his associates took the matter in hand, eliminating all the old-fashioned methods of production and transportation, that petroleum began to be the power and profit it is today. In 1890 the United States production of petroleum was 21,000,000 gallons. In 1917 it had risen to 13,440,000,000 gallons. Gasoline is still the chief derivative, but fuel oil has a great future.

Legal Blanks at the Courier.

SMITHS AND JOHNSONS WON THE GREAT WAR

Paris, Apr. 11.—The first name on the alphabetical list of the American expeditionary force is Private Aase and the last is Corporal Zeeppenfelt. Between the two names are more than 2,000,000 others.

George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, General Ulysses S. Grant, Robert E. Lee, Woodrow Wilson, several Caesars and a few Bismarks adorn the ranks with intermittent frequency.

Excluding the commander-in-chief of the army and navy, there is but one Woodrow Wilson. He is a private, and according to Stars and Stripes, has just been placed in the working personnel of Base Hospital No. 27, which was organized in Pittsburg.

There is an abundance of the names of great men including 74 George Washingtons. The name of the first president is surpassed by 79 Robert E. Lees, who holds the record for bearers of the name of great men. There are but two Abraham Lincolns and seven Grants; 12 Caesars and four Bismarks.

Among the "common people," there are about 51,000 Smiths. True to their traditional predominance of the directories of most cities, they dominate the American expeditionary force in numbers. There are 39,000 Johnsons, 22,500 Joneses and a like number of Greens. Sullivans aggregate 10,500, Browns 9,000, and Cohens 4,500.

St. Helena the Good. St. Helena according to a colonial report, appears to have no real criminals. Stone-throwing by night was for a short period the most serious offense. Last year no person was committed for trial; 104 out of 210 summary cases came under the education, road tax, and poor law ordinances and 77 trivial cases were dealt with by the police without bringing them to court. Three instances of flogging are recorded, under the juvenile smoking ordinance.
