SMALL ROCK IS USED

disco, there are many former prisoners on parole from the "rock" engaged in various lines of business who report once a month to the commandant.

The "big rock" rises almost sheer from the bay waters. The parade ground had to be hewn from the solid rock. Above the parade ground similar hewing was done for the prison buildings. Barracks for officers and the soldiers stationed as guards and administrators rise from near the bay and almost are mortised into the rocks. Many other difficulties were overcome.

Because of the profusion of flowers over the island and festooned about its rock walls the "big rock" by its officers is called, "our jewel." Skirting the island runs a railed walk supported by, and hung out from the rocks. The walls above and below the walk are a mass of flowers, which seemingly grow out from the rocks. To get the flowers to grow prisoners would drill a pocket in the rocks, throwing a few handfuls of earth and plant the seed.

Escape from the island is nearly impossible. Attempts made to swim the few hundred yards to the mainland have failed. Several men have been drowned in the effort. A few have escaped by rafts made of drift wood, however. At night a powerful searchlight plays about the island from a lighthouse on the island.
